### **Fire Fighter Equipment Check List**

(for you to keep as a reference)

Below is a list of equipment you <u>must</u> have in order to be deployed for firefighting <u>work</u> and <u>camp</u>. Those employees who show up for a deployment without the required equipment will be replaced. Also, we have included a list of suggested items that are beneficial and/or may make your time deployed more enjoyable.

# <u>MANDATORY</u> EQUIPMENT ITEMS YOU NEED TO HAVE AND MUST BRING WITH YOU - for local and out of town deployments

- ☐ **Your Training Tickets!!!** very important to bring your <u>held</u> tickets with you ... we recommend to laminate them.
  - Photo Identification
  - o First Aid Level 1 & Transportation Endorsement or Level 3
  - Crew Boss Ticket(s)
  - o Power Saw Operator or BCFSC Faller Certification
  - Danger Tree Assessor

## **Mandatory Camp Equipment**

You may be deployed out of town for a period of up to 2 weeks (24 days in Alberta) and must have your own tent and sleeping gear. You may be in a remote area without access to any stores so put some thought into what you may need to be comfortable at work and in camp.

#### CAMP EQUIPMENT ITEMS YOU NEED TO HAVE AND BRING:

	Tent & Sleeping Bag
	Duffel bag or hockey bag to hold all geargarbage bags & any loose gear NOT acceptable
	Clothing for 14 days – most camps have drop off laundry service
	Good work socks – important to keep your feet dry
	Warm jacket – it can get cold
	Towel(s) – towels are not provided at camp
	Water & Food – every crew member must be self-sufficient for first 24hours
	<b>Prescription Medication</b> – <u>if required</u> , enough for $14/24$ days (let your supervisor and FA attendant know what medication)
Add	itional Recommended Equipment for Work and/or Camp
	Bandana (or better) – for working in smoky conditions
	Hand held GPS (Global Positioning System)
	Multitool – i.e. leatherman or other brand
	Sunglasses
	Sunscreen
	Insect Repellant – you may find that this is a must
	Bear Spray – <u>not</u> to be taken inside helicopters
	Spare work gear – if you have spare work boots, etc.
	Inflatable bed, portable cot or foamy, blankets, pillow – it's always better to be warm and comfortable
	Over the Counter Medication – i.e Tylenol, antacid, cold medication, antihistamines, gravol, mole skin, etc.
	Personal hygiene products – shampoo, soap, tooth brush, etc.
	Reading material, cards, portable DVD etc. for entertainment at camp
	Flashlight or additional headlamp with spare batteries – for use in camp (not your firefighting headlamp)
	Small sewing kit
	Go cup for coffee – the cups at camp can be rather small if you're a coffee drinker
	Personal Cutlery (fork, knife, spoon) – camps provide wooden cutlery (sometimes plastic)
	Camera – you should get some great pictures (please set camera to a higher resolution for company use)
	<b>Cell Phone</b> – remote areas will not have cell service (make sure you have enough minutes if pay as you go)
	<b>Long Distance Phone Card</b> – can be used from any phone (much cheaper than collect or cell rates)
	<b>Tobacco</b> – if you smoke enough for 14 days
	Lighter
	<b>Spending money –</b> in the event we are near or in an urban area

This list is a guide so you should make sure you think carefully about the things you may need. If you think we should add something to this list then please let us know.

There is <u>ZERO TOLERANCE</u> for any alcohol or drugs while on deployment and/or in fire camps - see Standards of Conduct
